# Greetings Church Family!

February 22<sup>nd</sup> is Ash Wednesday. As you may know, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, the forty-day countdown (minus Sundays) to Easter. During these forty days, Christians are encouraged to take up a spiritual discipline such as prayer, fasting, and alms giving (see. Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21 for Scriptural support of these disciplines).

In the Christian church, we all look forward to Easter celebrations. We cannot wait to join the choruses of joy with all the generations that stood before us as we encounter the risen Christ who is victorious over sin and death. However, most of us are not overjoyed about the call for increased spiritual discipline during the season leading up to Easter. Why should I fast from things that I enjoy? Who has time for more prayer and devotion throughout our already busy day?

The reason that we find Lent to be such a burden, is because we make it about having to surrender something. It's forty days of either not getting to do something I want to do, or being forced to do things I may not immediately enjoy. However, I propose that this is precisely why we need Lent. Lent is an opportunity for us to force ourselves to slow down and reflect upon our behaviors and attitudes toward God and our neighbors. In other words, it's a time where we can decide where our hearts truly are, and what we treasure.

Lent is not a season for us to quit eating fast food so we can lose the extra winter weight we packed on during Christmas. Lent is not a forty-day self-help program directed to build healthy habits through exercise and dieting. Lent is not the time to revisit lost and long forgotten New Year's resolutions. Lent is our intentional journey with Jesus to Jerusalem – to the cross. And make no mistake, we cannot truly understand the joy of Easter without first coming to the cross.

So, I encourage you to embrace this season of spiritual discipline and reflection as a way to prepare for Easter. Honestly, it really doesn't take much extra time in the week to pick up a new spiritual practice. Maybe you can pick up a free online daily devotional to do in the morning. Or perhaps you may join our Sunday morning Bible study to wrestle with God's Word in a group setting. Or you may prefer to commit to going on a daily walk where you can connect with God through nature. Of course, there will be opportunities for communal worship during Lent such as Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In short, there will be plenty of ways for you to make this Lenten season fruitful in your Easter preparations.

Well, that is all I have for now – until next time my friends, be blessed. As always, keep our church in your prayers. If you find you are in need of support, please reach out to me. Always serve God with joy and praise; be of good courage; hold fast to what is good; support the weak; and help the afflicted. And let's pray that Punxsutawney Phil doesn't see his shadow on February 2<sup>nd</sup>!

# St. Paul United Church of Christ Council Minutes – November 14, 2022 at 7:00 p.m.
